CoC Seeks CLP Feedback for Operative Standards Study

The Assessing the Effectiveness and Significance of the Operative Standards Program (AESOP) study is a five-year, multi-institutional initiative funded by the National Cancer Institute. The AESOP team is evaluating how the CoC Operative Standards are implemented and their impact on cancer care. A central component of this work involves collecting insights from CLPs through national surveys. During the month that their programs are undergoing CoC Accreditation site visits, CLPs will receive a survey link from REDCap@facs.org. CLPs are asked to complete the 10-to-15-minute survey within 2 weeks of receiving the email. In appreciation for their time, CLPs will receive a \$25 gift card upon completion of the survey.

Learn More about CoC Standards for Rural Cancer

To better address the needs of hospitals providing cancer care in rural counties, the Commission on Cancer (CoC) has developed a category for participation that includes [standards tailored for rural hospitals](#). Hospitals located within a county that has a [Rural-Urban Continuum Code \(RUCC\)](#) of 4 through 9 are eligible to participate in the Rural Cancer Program (RCP) category. Current CoC programs that meet the eligibility criteria may switch from their existing categories to the RCP category in late 2026. The RCP modifications will also be added to Specifications by Category section of *Optimal Resources for Cancer Care (2020 Standards)* with its next update.

NCDB Releases 2024 CQIP Report

The [National Cancer Database](#) (NCDB) has released the 2024 Cancer Quality Improvement Program (CQIP) report. CQIP is a data-driven, process and outcomes-based cancer quality improvement initiative. This annual report is unique in providing short-term quality and outcome data and long-term outcome data, including 5-year survival rates for commonly treated malignancies stratified by stage. CQIP allows programs to assess their quality and outcomes based on data submitted to the NCDB. CoC-accredited programs can access this report through [QPort](#). Access Resources for New Smoking Cessation Standard
