I am delighted to hear from you and to know that you are enjoying good health. We are experiencing the first cold weather of the winter and it makes me want to start South immediately.



Dear Miss Grimm:

This morning upon receiving the Quarterly Bulletin of the American College of Surgeons, after noting mentally the future clinical congresses of the American College of Surgeons and gloating over the fact that my next door neighbor is President Elect of this distinguished body, I came to the contents and I immediately caught your name.

The tribute written by Dr. Rudolph Matas of New Orleans, Louisiana was certainly a heart-warming letter. I immediately called Dr. Foss' attention to it and he too was thrilled with the contents.

In his usual smooth manner, Dr. Matas placed in words feelings of those of us who are not as suave as he. Nevertheless, I too, Eleanor, add my deep appreciation for your unswerving loyalty to the organization which you represented so well. May I also say that I take great delight because of our relationship, in basking in your reflected glory.

Recently, Skeets and I returned from Mexico City where I had the pleasure of appearing at a "Round Table Seminar of Cataract Extractions" with five other ophthalmic surgeons. It was indeed a privilege and an honor to appear with them. I also had the satisfaction of showing my movies on Cataract Extractions. My report was on 382 cataract extractions performed under intravenous pentothal sodium (general) anesthesia. The paper will be published in the Transactions of the Fourth Pan-American Congress of Ophthalmology to be released some time in June. As you probably know, Eleanor, the majority of ophthalmic surgeons still adhere traditionally to the method of performing cataract extractions under local anesthesia. I do not subscribe to this type because I fear greatly the complications which occur when we have an un-

The hazards of the intravenous anesthesia are negligible when we have the benefit of a Certified Anesthesiologist. This series of 382 cataract extractions extends over a period of a little over five years. Following the meeting, we had the pleasure of visiting that delightful Pacific Coast resort, Acapulco where I succeeded in catching two dandy sailfish, one of which was eight and a half feet in length and weighed over one hundred pounds. The whole trip was thoroughly delightful. We crossed the continent on DC-6 in less than nine hours flying time, averaging 325 miles per hour. The same paper was read by me at the last clinical conference presented by the Wills Eye Hospital in Philadelphia in 1951. I am now looking forward to appearing on a program on May 9th at the Pennsylvania Academy of Ophthalmology and Otolaryngology in Reading, and also the Pennsylvania State Meeting in Philadelphia in September. We have just completed our first year here at the Foss Clinic and it goes without saying that we are all eminently pleased with the way things are going. The year in this department was one of great growth and productivity. May I take the liberty of enclosing comparative statistics of 1950 with 1951 indicating our growth in the past year. 
