Legislative Tracking Cancer Priorities

In 2025, the ACS State Affairs team tracked

- 583 cancer bills
 - 106 were enacted
- Provided legislative reports to the monthly Commission on Cancer meetings
- Sent letters of support for cancer legislation in the states
 - Worked with the dermatology coalition advocating to allow school students to use sunscreen and wear sun protective clothing in their schools.

State Advocacy Checklist

- Are you registered to vote?
 - Your vote is more important to a legislator than any amount of money
 - ❖ A legislator will check to see if you are registered and if you vote consistently
- Do you give to a PAC?
 - It doesn't buy a vote – it opens a door
 - Shows the legislator you are invested

ACS State Affairs

State Advocacy Checklist

Reach out to your legislator

- Look up your legislator using your state's legislative website
- Visit the legislator's website
- Review the information on their website to identify your representative's areas of interest
- Call or send an email their office to introduce yourself, ask for meeting – make sure to mention you are a constituent
 - If the legislator is not available, ask for the legislative aide responsible for health care issues



Current Landscape

- Congress has advanced into the second half of the 119th Congress. The immediate/short-term focus is the upcoming Government funding deadline on January 30, 2026. More information on this process in the coming slides.
- At the end of the 1st session there was concern regarding the expiration of the ACA enhanced premium tax credits. With no Congressional agreement in place these subsidies have expired.
 - These credits were enacted during the COVID-19 pandemic to lower premiums.
 - No package has yet been introduced that has been able to advance through both chambers.
- Over the last few weeks, particularly in the Senate, there has been rumor of a new deal that could be accepted by a majority of the chamber. ACS staff are continuing to monitor this and other large health packages.



Federal Government Funding

- In late 2025, Congress passed a package that funded several departments until September 2026.
 - Remaining departments, including HHS, were only funded through a continuing resolution until January 30, 2026.
- Last week, the House of Representatives advanced a “minibus” package of bills that would provide funding through September for the departments of energy, commerce, interior and justice.
 - Funding for HHS is still under consideration at this time.

Federal Government Funding



- HHS agencies (NIH/NCI, CDC, etc.) are currently funded at FY2025 discretionary levels.
 - The ACS Federal Team is continuing to highlight the need for continued funding for cancer research and care.
- No clear indication yet as to what the exact level of funding will be.
- At this point it would appear likely that a short-term continuing resolution may be used to avoid a government shutdown. More will be known in the coming days.

- **Supporters:** Individuals and organizations who invest in their campaigns




