

Evidently the new Association did not meet with the approve of either Henry B. Sands or T. M. Markoe, who were then pro fessors of surgery in the College of Physicians and Surgeon This was even more true of Boston, for not a single surgeon of that city appears in the list of original members, thougk four (Cheever, Fifield, Gay and Warron) were elected to active membership in 1882. At this meeting forty-eight surgeons signed the constitution and became the original Fellows......





Dear Eleanor:

Thank you very much for your nice letter. I was called before the Ethical Relations Committee of the Chicago Medical Society last Wednesday and thought you might be interested in what happened.

First, the original summons to appear was accompanied by a copy of the petition with all of the signers' names cut off and I had to request a complete and accutate copy which would conform to the policies of the Chicago Medical Society.

The list of signers is a very interesting one as you might well imagine. I was charged with "seeking individual publicity for personal gain in getting patients." Second, "with expressing an opinion which was not accurate", and third, with the fact that the opinion was detrimental to the whole profession. The opinion was, of course, that fee-splitting was on the increase in Chicago and the surrounding areas.

I prepared a very carefully worded statement which covered the whole matter but it was obvious at the hearing that the attack was on the American College of Surgeons and the Board of Regents. Eighteen of the signers had been refused admission to the College. They believed the Board of Regents had no right to meet with the press on any matters concerning medicine without first clearing the statements through the local medical scoeity and the state societies. Therefore, as a Regent in Chicago it was implied that I should not have sat in the meeting of the Regents at which the press conference took place, or secondly, that I should not have allowed quotations to be printed. This was streesed by one of the committee members and by the petitioners. Sometime I will let you read my statement in full. Warren Cole acted as my counsel. This is a real fight, in my opinion, by members of the Academy of General Practitioners who are making a concentrated effort to change the code of medical standards against organizations like the College It may very well become quite a national issue. Whilt would not surprise me if they decided in favor of the petitioners by perhaps a three to two vote, out of the committee of five, and carry on the fight. If so, then a lot of things will come out, in the open.

We could get, if you do not already have one, a copy of the list of Fellows in the College and you could check them off and we would send your letter out from Chicago as a personal letter.

Naturally, the composition of the letter would be very important in appealing for the fund. I think you could do it and I wish you would join in doing it because it would be a great tribute to Dr. Martin and I think he should have his name on something other than the College even though he was not directly associated with Passavant. Nevertheless, his relationship as a trustee of the University and as a graduate of the medical school would make it very fitting.






