

Dear Doctor Coller. -

Your heartwarming letter reached me in Chicago on the day I attended the reception for Dr. MacMachern on his day. August 16. I shall forever glow when I read the most flattering words which your letter contains - even though I know they are not fully deserved. No one has had a happier or more fortunate experience in the business world than I, and I am everlasting grateful that my steps were guided in the direction of the American College of Surgeons. To have been privileged to be a part of that great organization from its beginnings in 1913, and to have seen it grown through times of war, of stress, of plenty, of depression, again of war, and then of peace until the end of 1951 is an experience that I am sure has been paralleled by few. They were great chiefs under whom I served -- Franklin Martin, George Crile, Irvin Abell, Arthur Allen; and great Regents and Presidents whom I was privileged to know and to serve, and among them Your name is on the higher rung. I count your work of liaison among the Boards, the AMA, and the ACS as it concerns the basic sciences and graduate training among the great achievements of the College, and I shall so record it in the material for the history which I am now assembling. And this is true also of the masterful and super-diplomatic manner in which Doctor Allen handled the preliminary to the Accreditation Commission.

How I envied all of you on that European jaunt. It was a memorable occasion for the College. It was the second meeting in England of the College, for the 1914 session of the Clinical Congress was hald in London the last week of July, 1914, and it ended on the day the First World Wer was declared and all of the surgeons from the European continent scampered for their homelands, and the Americans came home as best they could after long delays caused by the cancellation of ships sailings. All of this is going into the material for the ACS history. Incidentally that history material has now developed into what I now consider more important - orientation material for any one who comes to the ACS in an official capacity. The necessity for this became apparent to me through the many inquiries which I was constantly receiving from officials at headquarters concerning events which transpired and actions taken. There what I am recording will be come a full report in abstract of everything that transpired - from th organization of the Surgical Publishing Company by Dr. Martin in 1905, through the organization of the Clinical Congress by him in 1910, and the organization and conduct of the ACS since 1912 when it was authori by the Clinical Congress. This is an informal way of sending you our best wishes for a Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year and affectionate greetings from the Collers.



## EMBASSY OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA

Caracas, Venezuela, December 7, 1940.

Dear Miss Grimm:

It is difficult to say these days just what is the function of a diplomat and I find nothing in the regulations about providing two handsome tall bachelors but I'll do the best I can by remote control. You know Panama is about 1200 miles west of here and by the way what has Panama got that Venezuela hasn't?

I am writing today to John Gorin, a tall handsome bachelor who represents the United Fruit Company in Panama asking him to give you and Mrs. Betty Lou Fisher his special attention. I am also writing to General Edgerton, Governor of the Panama Canal, and to Ambassador Dawson, whose wife by the way is the daughter of Dr. Jimmy Mitchell (F.A.C.S.) of Washington, D. C. Ethel, my wife, is writing to Mrs. Cy Helm, whose husband is President of the West India Oil Company. Since you are to be there on New Year's Eve I want you to get to the Union Club Ball which is one of the social events of the Continent. Don't miss it even if you have to crash the gate. YouRother evenings you can spend at the Balboa Beer Garden where there are always a few lonesome Naval or Army officers to be cheered up. I hope you have a grand time and I'm sure you will.

They have never been there. and you could make it one of the finest trips of their lives with the contacts you could establish for them and See if you can't push the matter along. It would be wonderful for the United States and for the College if they would plan to go. Needless to say I am hoping that there may be some small matters on which I could be of help to you on behalf of the good old U.S.A. I am already thrilled over the prospect of the trip and I do hope it will come to gruition.

Dear Eleanor, Working from faulty memory I sent a letter to you at "Fairmont" Florida. Then I ran across the real place and wrote to the Pstmaster at Fairmont, (there must be a Fairmont) asking him to forward it to you at Clermont. Maybe you'll get it and maybe wou will not. What I wanted to ask you was advice in making out my expense vouchers. Just before sailing and sincetime was lacking for an answer I suggested that mybrelation with the College be formalized by placing me on a dollar a year basis and permitting me to voucher for my expenses. This was agreed upon provisionally and they sent a deposit to my bank (National City of N.Y.) of a thousand dollars as an advance against my expenses. What I would like you to advise me about is whether they have a per diem policy or must actual details , bills, railroad and plane fares, taxies , tips etc beitemized. I have visited for the College and set up Committee with which we can correspond in the following countries: France, Germany, Italy, Monaco, Portugal, Spain and Switzerland. The experiences in those countries was most enjoyable. I was welcomed everywhere and in Spain they told me my visit was "like a ray of light in the darkness". That made me feel good. Incidentally the International College is holding its Congress in Madrid in May and making a big play for the Spanish surgeons. My visit was most timely. The Program of the American College is something that the World needs and it

has a momentous decision to make as to whether or not to assume this burden. It will have to be done sooner or later and now is the chosen time with the World in a turmoil and struggling for better things. As you wisely said it will take money but I think that for such a worthy objective the money will be made available if we really go after it in earnest. Otherwise this second rate organization of Thorek's is going to go ahead and do badly the thing that we could do well. I have made one concrete suggestion as a result o f my travels. I have asked that study be given to the idea of setting up a new office in the College to be called: The International Council. I arrived at this name after a lot of thought and after a process of selections and rejections. I have had no reaction as yet. Of course it would be just vapaper division until financed. I would appreciate your comments.

I am leaving here Monday and after one day in Paris
plan to embark on the America, sailing 12 March from
Le Havre, due in New York about St. Patrick's day.

I hope to have a letter from you awaiting my
arrival. With all good wishes, I am,


