Dear Representatives Ruppersberger and Kinzinger,

On behalf of the more than 82,000 members of the American College of Surgeons (ACS), I write in support of H.R. 5855, the *Bipartisan Solution to Cyclical Violence Act of 2020*. The grants provided by this legislation will help to establish and expand Hospital-based Violence Intervention program (HVIPs) as well as document the success of these programs to encourage best practices.

Injuries resulting from interpersonal violence in the U.S. are all too common. Nearly 1.5 million nonfatal injuries occur annually amongst individuals between the ages of 15 and 34, and the direct and indirect cost of these injuries is approximately \$12 billion. Trauma centers stand on the front lines of the interpersonal violence epidemic. With injury recidivism rates as high as 55 percent, trauma surgeons and other advocates are exploring ways to close this revolving door to decrease violent injury, similar to the methods that have been used effectively to reduce the incidence of cardiovascular disease and cancer.

HVIPs are multidisciplinary programs that identify patients at risk of repeat violent injury and link them with hospital and community-based resources aimed to address underlying risk factors for violence, such as mental health and social determinants of health. Data indicate the HVIPs reduce violent injury recidivism, as well as hospital costs, but more research is needed in order to better target these efforts and help spread them to areas of need around the country.

Trauma surgeons are frequently the ones treating victims of interpersonal violence. ACS believes that HVIPs located in, or partnering with, verified trauma centers can play a critical role in reducing reinjury and death by creating a way out of this cycle. Thank you for your efforts and leadership on this issue, ACS strongly supports the *Bipartisan Solution to Cyclical Violence Act*.
